Job 1: Summer 4-H Intern

4-H Youth Development within K-State Research & Extension (KSRE) is seeking multiple Educators/Summer Interns to provide high quality local and regional 4-H programming to Kansas youth. Educators/Interns will be responsible for planning, organizing, facilitating and teaching lessons to youth with research-based curriculum provided by K-State Research & Extension.

Position: May 28th to August 9th, 35-40 hours per week

Responsibilities:

- Plan, coordinate, promote, teach and evaluate educational programs under the direction of the local Extension Agent(s) and state-wide Engagement Leader team.
- Partner with community groups and schools for summer programming;
- With help from local extension staff, Educators/Interns will market communications about programs and events through various platforms and communication sources (social media, email, newspaper, 4-H Newsletter, local school districts, libraries, 4-H Clubs, etc.)
- Coordinate and teach Extension programs through 4-H summer camps, day camps, and other youth events through local extension office.
- Distribute, collect and report on program evaluations for programs delivered.
- Encourage youth and volunteer recruitment in the local 4-H program.
- Participate in professional staff development.
- Complete other responsibilities assigned by the local extension agent and/or Engagement Leader Team to do with the 4-H grant program.

Job 2: Retail Associate

Hometown Grocery is looking to hire summer help, may continue into the school year if situations work out. Working in a retail sales position can be a great experience for a teen as they learn to deal with customers, communicate with managers and co-workers, and handle money. Retail associate will be responsible for stocking, cashier work, bagging and general cleaning.

Position: May 20 to August 3, could be extended, 20 hours per week

Responsibilities:

- Customer service is the utmost skill that you will need to obtain.
- Communication with owner, manager and other associates.
- Physical actions as stocking and facing shelves, assisting customers with bulk orders and carrying bags to their cars.
- Ability to count change and work with computer, cash register as a cashier.
- Participate in team meetings each week to help collaborate all tasks as a team.
- General cleaning, sweeping and windows as assigned
- Complete other responsibilities assigned by owner and manager.

Job 3: Farmhand/ Farm Worker

Teens who live in rural areas full of farmland may want to pursue a job as a farmhand or farm worker. It's helpful to already understand agriculture and farm equipment when pursuing this work. It's also important to be ready to handle day-long physical labor and be willing to work outdoors in all weather.

Position: May 20th to August 9th, could include some 12 hour days.

Responsibilities:

- Giving food and water to the livestock
- · Cleaning and disinfecting animal living areas, including hutches, cages and pens
- Spraying fertilizers and pesticides on crops to help encourage growth and prevent damage form weeds, fungi and insects
- Operating and maintaining farm equipment, including vehicles and machinery
- Harvesting fruit and vegetables by hand
- Repairing farm buildings, fences and other property
- Branding, tagging or otherwise marking livestock for identification and grading purposes
- Herding livestock into grazing pastures, or for weighing or onto trucks for transportation

Job 4: Daycare Assistant

Teens who enjoy working with children may want to consider working as a daycare assistant. However, the requirements for working in a daycare vary by state and many states require daycare workers to be at least 18 years old. Some states may allow 16 to 17-year-olds to work as assistants as long as they meet certain requirements and are supervised by an adult. This job will typically involve preparing activities and meals and possibly changing diapers.

Position: May 1st to August 30th, hours would be 10:00am to 4:00pm daily Monday thru Friday

Responsibilities:

- · Supervise and monitor the safety of children
- Prepare and organize mealtimes and snacks for children
- Help children keep good hygiene
- Change the diapers of infants and toddlers
- Organize activities or implement a curriculum that allows children to learn about the world and explore their interests
- Develop schedules and routines to ensure that children have enough physical activity, rest and playtime
- Watch for signs of emotional or developmental problems in children and bring potential problems to the attention of parents or guardians
- Keep record of children's progress, routines and interests
